Annual Report on the Activities of the Department of Music,

October 1, 1956 to October 1, 1957

During the period covered by this report a committee was appointed by the Bishop to study the needs of the Cathedral organ. The committee recommended to the Chapter that a contract be let for a new console. This has been done, and the Aeolian-Skinner Organ Company has agreed to install the new console in the summer of 1958. The committee further recommended to the Chapter that the organ be rebuilt and reserviced, and two new sections added to the instrument, according to specifications drawn by Joseph S. Whiteford, president of the Aeolian-Skinner Organ Company, in order to make it more suitable for the increased space in the building. Although the Chapter accepted the recommendations of the committee, the project of enlarging and rebuilding the organ must wait until approximately \$100,000 is provided for the purpose.

The Cathedral Choir of 30 boys and 22 men has given its customary faithful and devoted service. Aside from regular services of the Cathedral, it has performed many musical services. Larger works sung have been Bach's St. John Passion, Faure's Requiem, Sowerby's Forsaken of Man, Byrd's Mass for Five Voices, Egon Wellesz's Mass in F Minor, and Robert F. Twynham's Mass for Men's Voices and Organ (first performance). At other musical services, compositions by the following composers were sung: Purcell, Schutz, Gibbons, Tye, Byrd, Scheidt, Vittoria, Dering, Allegri, di Lasso, John Preston, Holst, Howells, Searle Wright, John La Montaine, Harold Friedell, David McK. Williams, Healey Willan, and Richard Dirksen.

The Washington and Cathedral Choral Societies sang their customary three concerts in the Cathedral with orchestra and guest soloists. The

first of these concerts was under the joint auspices of the Cathedral, the Washington Hebrew Congregation, and the Musicians' Union; it was presented on two consecutive emenings, first at the Temple of the Washington Hebrew Congregation, and then in the Cathedral. The program of the concert consisted of Ernest Bloch's Sacred Service and Mendelssohn's Hymn of Praise. The second concert was a complete performance of Bach's St. Matthew Passion on the afternoon and evening of Palm Sunday, and with the assistance of the boys of the Cathedral Choir. The third concert was a presentation of the Berlioz Requiem, with the assistance of the Glee Clubs of the National Cathedral School for Girls and the St. Albans School.

These two Glee Clubs, under the direction of the Associate Organist and Choirmaster, continued their tradition of expert music-making on their own. They were responsible for the music of the Christmas pageant, and they sang a spring concert of music for chorus and orchestra. Their season was climaxed by two performances of an original musical play, "Houseboat on the Styx", written, produced and directed by their director, Richard Dirksen.

Six new choirboys were appointed from Mr. Dirksen's junior choir of 30 boys. The junior choir has maintained its usual schedule of three rehearsals and three services each week.

Aside from the choral society concerts with orchestra, there were these other occasions when additional instrumental accompaniment was used in Cathedral services: 3 trumpets at the service for the Y.W.C.A. on November 11; brass quartet and timpani at the dedication of the Woodrow Wilson Memorial Bay and Tomb on November 11; an orchestra of 17 players for Bach's St. John Passion on Good Friday; brass quartet and timpani at the 11 a.m. Service at the Red Cross on May 19; 3 trumpets at the Ascension Day

Day service for St. Albans School; the bagpipes of the Society of Pipers at the Kirkin' o' the Tartan, May 12; the U.S. Marine Band Brass Choir at the Massing of the Colors, May 26; 3 trumpets at the Commencement service of St. Albans School; brass quartet and timpani at the Fiftieth Anniversary Service on September 29.
